THE DOCTRINE OF BAPTISM

Goals ...

On completing this unit you should be able to:

1. Understand how those living in New Testament times understood baptism;
2. Be able to explain the significance of John the Baptist's Ministry;
3. Know in brief the events in Jesus' Baptism;
4. Understand that the Bible teaches that all Christians are to be baptized; and
5. Respond in obedience to the Bible's instruction to be baptized.

Introduction

1. Welcome to our study on baptism. The five lessons which follow are designed to help you understand what the Bible teaches about baptism.
2. As we will see, baptism is a necessary step for each and every Christian.
3. We will begin by considering what baptism meant to the people living in Jesus' day. We will then look at what Jesus did and said concerning baptism
4. As you work through these lessons, please write any questions or comments you have in the book so we can discuss them together in our class!

LESSON ONE: JOHN THE BAPTIST

1.1 In Mark 1: 2-3, Mark records the prophet Isaiah's prediction concerning the coming of "a messenger." Isaiah predicted that a "messenger" would be sent to prepare the way for Jesus. Isaiah had written these words hundreds of years before John the Baptist was born.

Did you know?

Several religious groups practiced baptism before John the Baptist was born? The Hebrews baptized Gentiles who wanted to join the Jewish church. Another religious group, the Essenes, baptized people who wanted to join their group.

LESSON TWO: THE BAPTISM OF JESUS

“MY TESTIMONY” – TELLING YOUR STORY!

Preparing your testimony for Baptism:

This section is designed to help you prepare your testimony (your spiritual story) so that you can make a public declaration before your baptism.

Keep it short!

A well prepared, well practiced, 2-3 minute testimony can be powerfully used by God to communicate the gospel and transform lives. It takes effort to get our stories down to 1/2 to 3/4 of a typed page, but the results are excellent. Try to avoid all Christian jargon that those unfamiliar with the church may not understand. If possible include 1 or 3 verses of Scripture that speak of God's work and promise in your life.

General outline to guide you:

1. My life before I became a follower of Jesus (My need)

- it is important to demonstrate that you had a need
- explain your “sin condition” but avoid sensationalism

2. How God drew me to Himself (His search)

- people involved
- events / crisis / miracles God used
- significant Bible verses

3. What Jesus did for me (His grace)

- forgave me, saved my life, delivered me, etc
- gave me peace
- gave me eternal life

4. What changes have come about since Jesus forgave me

- areas of deliverance
- areas of change (attitudes, actions, thoughts)
- areas of continuing need and prayer
- God's promise(s) for me (closing Bible verse)

Do your best to string together the above points into a smooth, free flowing story. Invite your baptism class leader to offer any “fine tuning” suggestions. Make copies to give to friends as God gives you opportunities.

The Importance of Prayer:

Please take time to pray as you prepare your testimony and as you practice it. Ask God to give you the right words to say and the ability to communicate them clearly. Pray that your story will encourage other Christians and help bring those seeking Jesus closer to the place where they will trust him with their lives.
